Until I was exposed to orchid growing, the only thing I knew about these plants was their exotic, aristocratic image. I had never been the green thumb type, but I was nonetheless intrigued when I saw a tiny advertisement in The New York Times for Venamy Orchids in Brewster, NY. This was the early 1990's, and being in the throes of a graduate school program in upstate NY, "spare time" and "leisure" were unfamiliar terms. During the summer I occasionally disappeared from the laboratory for a weekend and indulged myself by visiting my parents at their lake house near Danbury, CT. On one visit, I talked my Mom into coming along with me to visit this retail orchid business. The greenhouse was quite impressive as were the blooming plants and the prices. The variety of shapes, sizes, and colors were stunning. Could these all really be orchids? Being in very unfamiliar territory, I resisted temptation and did not purchase a plant that I surely would be unable to keep alive for more than a few months.

Fast forward several years. I had finished graduate school, and I was working in a research group for a professor at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. While living in the neighboring town of Carrboro, I usually went to the farmers' market on Saturday mornings. On one such occasion, I met a member of the Triangle Orchid Society who was selling orchids at reasonable prices. Maybe the prices were really not reasonable when compared to an African violet, but after all, the seed had been planted several years earlier in Brewster, NY, and now was the time for action. I really can not remember what the plant was, and I am quite sure that is no longer with us. This gentleman's easy manner and willingness to recruit new Triangle Orchid Society members sealed the

deal. I would have people to hold my hand through this new experience, and I might even make a few new friends along the way. From this point onward I suspect that many of us share a very similar experience that I think of as the slippery slope of orchid collecting and growing. Knowledge and confidence increased with each month's society meeting and each new issue of Orchids. On top of this, the opportunity to purchase additional plants became all too easy with society meetings, regional society shows, and the discovery of several local orchids retailers. Did I forget mail order? I think the true kid-in-the-candy-store moment came when I made the drive from NC down to Newberry, SC. Before moving back to the Northeast to start a new job, I figured that I needed to see Carter and Holmes with my own eyes. With a credit card in hand and numerous greenhouses full of orchids to see, I was in trouble. Let's just say that what happens in Newberry, SC stays in Newberry, SC!

The **Joint President's Council** of the metropolitan New York Area in conjunction with the **American Orchid Society** present the 25th "Speakers' Day" featuring talks by leading orchid authorities from all parts of the world. The daylong event will highlight four outstanding speakers; orchid plant and book sale raffle of fine plants; morning refreshments and a complete lunch, all included in the registration price of \$39.00. COME MEET, HEAR AND TALK WITH THESE INTERNATIONALLY RECOGNIZED SPEAKERS:

Carlos Fighetti has grown and been involved in orchids for more than 30 years. He has served as a volunteer in many positions in the past for The American Orchid Society and is currently the President of the AOS. He is the past President of the Greater New York Orchid Society, where he also served for eight years as Show Chair. In addition, he is a member of many other Orchid Societies and a current director of the International Phalaenopsis Alliance. An accredited AOS Judge, Carlos has judged in many international Orchid Shows. He lives in Guaynabo, Puerto Rico, where he grows a beautiful mixed collection of over 1,500 orchid plants, many of which are species. The subject of his talk will be: "The 'other' Phalaenopsis species and their varieties"

Frank Smith moved to Florida in the late 1970s and has since built one of the most successful Orchid nurseries in the United States, (Krull Smith). Frank excels as a highly knowledgeable hybridizer and grower of all types of Cattleya, Paphiopedilums and Phalaenopsis as well as other genera. Frank Smith, an AOS certified Judge in the North Florida Judging Center, has received over 675 American Orchid Society Awards through December 1, 2007: AQ(21), FCC (39), AM (437), HCC (183), CCE (seven), CCM (30), CHM (one), CBR (one) and JC. He will be talking to us about hybridizing and growing his magnificent Paphiopedilums, which has been described as his obsession

Ron McHatton, a PhD Chemist by training, is currently the AOS Director of Education and Regional Operations and an Accredited Judge. Prior to accepting this position he was Apopka production manager for Kerry's Bromeliad Nursery, possibly the largest wholesale orchid nursery in the United States. Ron has been growing orchids for more than 43 years and has an eclectic collection of plants representing a wide cross-section of the orchid family. Ron's passion for orchids has spanned virtually every growing regime from windowsills to under lights to greenhouses running from a 200 square foot hobby house to several acres of commercial growing space. Over the years his private collection has numbered in excess of 2500 plants. In addition to Ron's volunteer and professional support of the AOS, he has also been a long-time supporter of the Orchid Digest, and has been its President for three consecutive terms. The subject of his talk will be: "Sex in the greenhouse'.

Juan Carlos Uribe, Graduated in Agronomy from the National University of Colombia, Received a master's degree in Agronomy from Texas A&M University. He has been growing Orchids since 1984. With his wife Andrea, founded **Orquideas del Valle** in 1986 where they specialize in Colombian Orchid species for export and Hybrids for the local market. Since 1994 Juan Carlos has been the award photographer for the Cauca Valley Orchid Society and has participated as an orchid judge in both National and International Shows. He is also a noted lecturer about Orchids from Colombia as well as the world of Orchids.
